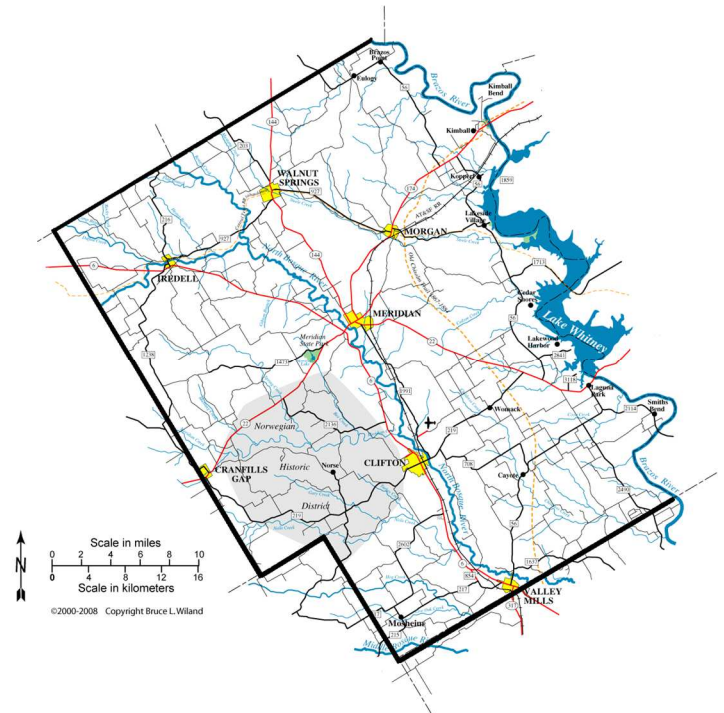

NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

AS ADOPTED BY THE CENTRAL TEXAS YOUTH FAIR

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels. All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of policies for all junior exhibitors and all junior livestock in competitive events:

1. The Central Texas Youth Fair makes available to County Extension Agents Family Consumer Science Teachers and Agriculture Science Teachers the opportunity to enter their members from Bosque County.
2. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
3. Owners/exhibitors shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
4. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
5. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of volatile drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner/exhibitor and parent for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood or other samples taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved, and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate, and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner/exhibitor and parent to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian, and reported to the official C.T.Y.F. veterinarian.

6. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug, or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs, horns or animals which affect appearance only, and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6a. No stomach pumps or tubes will be allowed. Drench guns are acceptable.
7. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance or other similar practices is not acceptable and is prohibited.
8. Direct criticism or interference with the judges, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect, and no person shall direct abusive or threatening acts.
9. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners/exhibitors who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds, and shall conduct toward them.

9. All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts.
10. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners/exhibitors who violate the code
11. No owner/exhibitor or parent shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this Code of Ethics, or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this Code of Ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
12. The application of this Code of Ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner/exhibitor, whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this Code of Ethics.
13. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner/exhibitor and parent to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be shared with other fairs, livestock shows and organizations of fairs and livestock shows.
14. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner/exhibitor and parent that he or she has read this National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by this code. It is a further consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state or provincial statutes, regulations or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.
15. All CTYF animals will need to stay stalled in barns, with the exception of cattle, which will be able to be at tie-outs between 6pm and 8am. They must be at designated CTYF tie-outs, not anywhere else. *This excludes commercial heifers.*

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Misconduct will cause an exhibitor to be dismissed immediately from the show and forfeit any awards and premium money.

1. Direct criticism or interference with the judges, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect, and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them. Anyone using abusive, indecent, profane or vulgar language, making offensive gestures or display or abuses, or threatens a person will be warned off the fair grounds, may be criminally prosecuted, and may be barred from future fairs and livestock shows with no recourse or appeal. This rule applies to owner/exhibitors, parents or any other natural person entered in or attending the fair or livestock show, meetings or any other events conducted by the Central Texas Youth Fair.
2. The Central Texas Youth Fair makes available to County Extension Agents, Agriculture Science Teachers and FCCLA the opportunity to enter their members from Bosque County.
3. All exhibits will be under the control and direction of the Fair Association, which will use diligence to assure the safety of all exhibits and to protect against loss or damage, but under no circumstances will the management be responsible for any loss or damage done or acquired while on the grounds of the show.
4. No claim or suit for injury to any person or property shall be asserted against the show or its sponsor, its officers or agents, by any person, firm or

corporation, or their agents, representatives, servants or employees having permits to exhibit or occupy space on the grounds of the show.

5. All applications for entry must be made in writing on printed forms which may be obtained from the AST, FCCLA Advisor, CEA or at: <http://bosque.agrilife.org/>. All signatures are required.

6. **TIME OF ENTRIES: All junior show, crop, ag mechanics, blueprint, cake, Jr. HE Entries and fees are due to the HE Building on May 1 from 4pm to 7pm OR on May 2, 2023 from 4pm to 7pm at HE Building.**

Open Show HE Entries may be brought on May 1 or May 2 from 4pm to 7pm to the HE Building OR must be mailed to CTYF at PO Box 562, Clifton, Texas 76634 with a postmark on or before May 2, 2023. Must include all appropriate signatures.

Late entries will be accepted on some divisions. May 3rd to check-in entry fee is \$200 . Ag Mech will not accept late entries.

7. Premiums and ribbons will be given according to the number of projects shown in each class.
8. **The decision of the judges shall be final.**
9. Exhibitor must be in the third grade at time of entries on May 1st and be a member in good standing in 4-H, FFA or FCCLA. Animals must be shown by owner, or another eligible exhibitor.
10. Students must be eligible to participate according to UIL rules—no pass, no play.
11. Exhibitor **must** personally feed and care for the animal under the supervision of the county agent or FFA advisor.
12. Any animal fed or cared for by a custom fitter at any time during the fair is not eligible to exhibit. A custom fitter is considered anyone who is not an immediate family member, a 4-H or FFA member from the same club which the animal is entered, a 4-H or FFA parent, county agent or agriculture science teacher.
13. Any entry not meeting requirements of Health Officer, Superintendents or Sifting Committee shall be barred from the show and must be removed from the fair grounds.
14. **RELEASE OF LIVESTOCK:** See Department
15. **NO REFUNDS WILL BE MADE ON ENTRY FEES AFTER ENTRY'S CLOSE DEADLINE.**
16. Each exhibitor is entitled to three entries in any single class but will be allowed to win prize money on only two.
17. Questions regarding general rules or regulations, class breaks, sale order, etc., must be discussed with the exhibitor's FFA or 4H advisor prior to discussion with any official of the CTYF. When the rules do not cover a situation that arises, the Fair Association shall have the authority to take proper action.
18. All protests must be made in writing to the CTYF General Superintendent. All protests either initiated by an exhibitor, parent, guardian or AST/CEA/FCCLA must be reviewed by the exhibitor's FCCLA, FFA or 4-H advisor and accompanied by a deposit of \$50.00 per person and must be submitted within one hour of the end of the applicable show. This deposit is non-refundable.
19. Classes may be split if eight (8) or more of the same breed are entered.
20. Any exhibitor violating any department rules or general rules may be barred from participation in all classes entered and future shows. Entry fees, placings, prize money, awards and Sale proceeds may be forfeited after review by Fair Association.
21. Ownership Validation Guidelines are as follows for Bosque County exhibitors showing livestock eligible for the Sale:

Broilers: Each exhibitor will be assigned 25 band numbers at time of chick delivery. Wing band numbers will be checked at the show. Any alteration or sign of tampering of wing bands will result in disqualification.

Market Steers, Lambs, Goats, Swine, and Rabbits: As set and publicized

by the Central Texas Youth Fair Validation Committee and Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, livestock may be CTYF or State of Texas validated. Livestock with current State of Texas validation will be eligible and do not require a CTYF validation.

Breeding Beef Heifers: Validation is not required but must have registration paper in the exhibitors name at time of check-in.

County Validation: Validation of animals must occur on the dates listed and no validations will occur or be set on dates after the published dates, except in the dire case of a medical or family emergency. If the published dates present a major conflict, then exhibitors can request an early validation. The validation committee will work with but not guarantee the request will be honored. The request should be made at least 10 days prior to published validation dates. Athletic events & league sports will likely not qualify as a major conflict.

22. Any animal that is wild or requires handling by more than one person at weighing, sifting or exhibiting will be sifted.
23. **Use of Drugs and Testing:** The use by non-veterinarians of animal drugs or other substances in any manner other than in accord with the labeling approved by FDA is a violation of federal law. Exhibitor and exhibitor's parents and/or guardians agree that: (1) they are absolutely responsible persons for the care and custody of their animals, (2) the Central Texas Youth Fair shall be entitled to disqualify an exhibitor whose animal tests positive for any drug, even if the exhibitor and the exhibitor's parents and/or guardians are innocent of any wrongdoing and did not administer the drug, (3) the drug test results of the testing laboratories are final and binding upon the exhibitor and the exhibitor's parents and/or guardians. Even if the drug is unknown, the Central Texas Youth Fair shall be entitled to disqualify the exhibitor.

Unapproved Drug Use: The showing of any animal that has been administered during its life any quantity of any unapproved drug, chemical or medication is strictly prohibited. Such drugs include, but are not limited to, any diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant or other unapproved medication. Unapproved means not approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and/or the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) for slaughter animals including animals that may be destined for human consumption.

Approved Drug Use: If an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for their species, sufficient time must have passed so that the animal does not test positive for the drug at weigh-in. All animals must be free and clear of all drug and chemical residues at the time of weigh-in, and must remain free of drug residue for entire course of the fair. Please note, elimination time (the time it takes for no drug residue to be found in the system) is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most approved drugs.

Security: All exhibitors are responsible for security of their own animal(s) until they depart for their final destination (processing/ranch). The exhibitor is the absolute insurer of, and is responsible for, the condition of their animal(s), regardless of the acts of a third party. CTYF is not responsible for lost, stolen or damaged property.

Inspection/Testing: The exhibitor agrees to submit any animal, breeding and/or market, entered by him/her to inspection by any veterinarian appointed by the Fair Association and agrees to have such animal submitted to such tests as may be requested at any time. The Central Texas Youth Fair also reserves the right to have ultrasound, DNA, blood and/or urine laboratory analysis made on any animal entered for competition. The exhibitor, including his/her parent or guardian, or AST or CEA for Junior exhibitors, must be present during the collection for testing and must witness, seal, and sign the sample, thus verifying the sample to be properly collected and prepared for analysis. The conclusions reached by the veterinarian and analysis shall be final and conclusive without recourse against the Central Texas Youth Fair or any officer, director or employee thereof, or any veterinarian as appointed by the Fair Association. The exhibitor waives any right of action which he might have for any action taken under this rule, and releases the Central Texas Youth Fair and the veterinarian from any and all claims or demands whatsoever in connection

with the inspection or testing of any such animal or any ruling or action taken by reason of the conclusion of such veterinarian.

24. Stomach pumps or tubes of any kind are **NOT** allowed. Drench guns are allowed.
25. Any exhibitor who violates any rule may have that particular entry disqualified from the show and Premium Sale of Livestock. The exhibitor will forfeit his entry's placing in the class, any ribbons or trophies won, any prize money, and will **FORFEIT ALL MONEY PAID FOR THE PROJECT BY BUYERS IN THE SALE OF PROJECT**. The exhibitor will also be prohibited from participating in the next year's Central Texas Youth Fair.
26. **Dress Code:** Must wear long pants or skirts below the knee. **No ripped jeans or jeans with holes, rips or tears.** All shirts must be long enough to be tucked in and stay tucked in when arms are extended above the head and have a **collar** and capped sleeves. Tank tops, muscle shirts, halter-tops, midriff shirts, transparent shirts and sleeveless shirts are not permitted.
27. **SALE ONLY:** All exhibitor's must show and sell their own livestock but may be exempted from being present on sale day due to an unforeseen emergency or approved 4-H, FFA, FCCLA or UIL activity. All other circumstances must be presented to the CTYF executive committee for final discussion.
28. **If an Blue Print or Build Off team member opts to sell another project, they must scratch their portion of their Blue Print or Build Off sale total. The scratched amount will be split between the remaining team members. There will only be one sale check per exhibitor.**
29. **No alcoholic beverages in any animal barn.**
30. All sale animals' validation information will be verified.
31. National Show Ring Code of Ethics as adopted by the Central Texas Youth Fair Association is considered as part of the general rules.
32. Showmanship contests are limited to Juniors and Seniors in each department. To be eligible, the entry must be entered in the Department and exhibitor must show his or her own animal. Showmanship Divisions as of May 1st this show year: Junior Division(3rd-7th grade) and Senior Division (8th-12th grade) .
33. Any exhibitor having sold a CTYF entered animal at an another stock show during the past twelve months is not eligible to sell same project at CTYF.
34. **And unofficial floor buyer will be available. Check with Fair Office for more information.**

LIVESTOCK STALLING

All CTYF animals will need to stay stalled in barns, with the exception of cattle, which will be able to be at tie-outs between 6pm and 8am. They must be at designated CTYF tie-outs, not anywhere else. *This excludes commercial heifers.*

Livestock shall be stalled in designated areas and stall assignments will be assigned by the livestock superintendents, Stall set-ups shall be so that they do not interfere with normal fair activity. Fair Officials hold the right to have exhibitors move or remove stall set-ups upon their discretion. Interfering or refusing to comply with fair official's order may result in disciplinary action up to disqualification and or removal from the fair grounds. Trailer stalling will be allowed, but will only be allowed in designated areas. A map of designated areas will be available in the fair office.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION

The Central Texas Youth Fair will abide by all rules and regulations of the Texas Animal Health Commission which are in effect at the time of the fair.

Following is a summary of the Texas Animal Health Commission regulations as will be applied by the Central Texas Youth Fair as of the date of the printing of this catalog. LIVESTOCK (CATTLE, SHEEP, SWINE, GOATS)

A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is not required.

RABBITS

A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is not required.

BROILERS

Broilers must have originated from breeding flocks that have met the pullorum-typhoid requirements of the National Poultry Improvement Plan.

GENERAL

In addition to the above listed requirements and recommendations it is suggested that all livestock be treated with an approved insecticide prior to arrival on the fairgrounds.

All animals on the fairgrounds may be subject to veterinary inspection at any time by the Official Fair Veterinarian. Animals found to be infected with or exposed to any contagious or communicable disease, or heavily infested with external parasites will be denied entry onto the fairgrounds or will be expelled from the fairgrounds and disqualified from participation in the Central Texas Youth Fair.

Department Rules

All General Rules and Code of Ethics apply to this Department.

1. All animals must be purebred, certified percentage female, or AOB/ABC. Exhibitors must have with them the registration papers for purebred and certified percentage females. AOB/ABC females must be tattooed in the letters AOB or ABC in the left ear and the date of birth in the right ear. The animals must have registration paper in exhibitors name at check-in.
2. Heifer registration papers must be presented at check-in prior to 1:00 pm on Thursday in the fair office . All heifers may be checked to see that the identification on the heifer matches their registration papers.
3. Entry fees are \$20.00 per head and must accompany the entry form when entered. 50% pay back.
4. **No GLUES or ADHESIVES allowed (Blow and Go).**
5. Birth date of the animal must be on entry form.
6. **Pen assignments will be provided by superintendent. See page 8 General Rules.**

BREEDING HEIFER CLASSES:

1. **British Breeds Division**
2. **American Breeds Division**
3. **European Breeds Division**
4. **Other Registered Breeds Division**
5. **AOB/ABC** - Animals without registration papers will not be eligible for Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion.
 - A. If there are three animals or less in a breed division, animals will show in a single class.
 - B. If there are four or more to a breed division, animals will be broken into classes of no more than four month age spread.

5. Failure to provide hair samples for DNA analysis, or analysis that does not confirm a parenting match that isn't in compliance with the native entry guidelines, will be considered a rule violation and subject to disciplinary action from the CTYF association.

All General Rules and Code of Ethics apply to this Department.

1. Entries due by May 1st (Blue Prints will be released after entry is paid)
2. Entry fee: \$50.00 per project
3. Entries must be made on an official Ag Mechanics Entry form and signed by the AST/CEA overseeing the project. Exhibitors and projects must be listed on entry form at time of entry.
4. Eligible Entries: Entries must be the work of eligible exhibitors – limited to Texas FFA and 4-H members. Please refer to the General Rules Ag Mechanic Rules.
5. Projects: must be constructed by FFA & 4-H members. FFA projects must be constructed as a part of their agriculture mechanic instruction in agriculture science or as part of their supervised work experience program. 4-H projects must be constructed under the supervision of their County Extension Agent.
6. Club/Chapter Entries: Group entries must be made in the name of the FFA Chapter or 4-H club. All group entries must include all the names of the exhibitors who participated in planning and construction of the project.
7. Group: Projects will be constructed by an individual or a group up to 4 members.
8. Construction Date: Project begin date will be after the start of the New Year.
9. Safety: All safety procedures must be adhered to when displaying projects.
10. Project completeness: All projects should be complete including finish. Projects are to be clean, free of dust and debris, and in a presentable condition. Any item, necessary for use of the project must be a part of it (example: hinges and latches on gates and panels, etc.). The project display area (including the floor under and around the project) should be neat. Floor covering will be limited to the area under the project.
11. Welds: No structural welds are to be ground without penalty. Grinding is to be limited to welds that should be ground for functional reasons and/or welds that would normally be ground for cosmetic purposes. Examples: top rails on trailers, fender body outside tops, side latches, etc. may be ground, but frames, cross-members, tongues, filler pipe, etc. are not to be ground.
12. Exhibitor Presentation: Exhibitors should be dressed appropriately and be with their project when it is judged. Exhibitors should be courteous and helpful to those viewing their project including the public, show officials, and judges. Exhibitors should not interfere with or shield those exhibitors next to them. Exhibitors will be allowed cleaning or preparation supplies.
13. Exhibitors must be present to present projects. Absence must be approved by committee.
14. Signs: All projects are to be identified. Information should include: Exhibitor's Name, Club/Chapter, and Project Description. Additional signs, banners, etc. must meet the approval of the committee members and cannot extend beyond the project's display space.
15. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion projects will be eligible for the Sale of Champions.
16. **If a Blue Print team member opts to sell another project, they must scratch their portion of their Blue Print sale total. The scratched amount will be split between the remaining team members. There will only be one sale check per exhibitor.**

Purpose of this contest is to simulate real-world working conditions found on any construction job site where wood and/or metal fabrication and safe working skills are required.

1. Entries due by May 2nd.
2. Entry fee: \$100.00 plus material cost set by vendors of CTYF.
3. Entries must be made on an official CTYF entry form and signed by the AST/CEA overseeing the project. Exhibitors names must be included on entry forms.
4. Eligible Entries: Entries must be the work of eligible exhibitors – limited to Texas FFA and 4-H members. Please refer to the General Rules Ag Mechanic Rules.
5. A team will consist of (2-4) 4-H or FFA members under the supervision of their AST/CEA (or designated school/club official). Team members must be from same club.
6. **If a Build Off team member opts to sell another project, they must scratch their portion of their Build Off sale total. The scratched amount will be split between the remaining team members. There will only be one sale check per exhibitor.**
7. ALL of the materials must be precut by superintendent.
8. All materials will be placed in front of each team's work area by superintendent.
9. Each team must bring ALL of their own power, tools, and equipment to construct their project.
10. Each team is required to bring two (2) fire extinguishers.
11. There will be NO equipment/power supplied for any teams. Participants must bring everything needed, but not limited to: generators, stands, extension cords, welders, electrodes, etc. **What you bring is what you work with.**
12. ALL welding will be completed using the SMAW or FCAW welding processes.
13. A completed project will be provided as a reference for the students.
14. Work areas will be preassigned and marked.
15. The parts list will be covered at the first meeting, which ALL advisors are required to attend.
16. Once the call for constructions to begin, there will be NO help from advisors, parents, friends, or spectators.
17. Each team will be judged throughout their build on safety procedures, site cleanliness, and work being done. ALL electrode stubs, trash, etc., should be picked up by the end of the build time.
18. Safety glasses, as well as, any and ALL applicable PPE must be worn at all times during the contest. No sharing of PPE between team members.
19. ALL construction will cease when the signal is given at the end of the build time.
20. Judging of the finished project's structure, welds, integrity and functionality, along with completeness, will begin immediately following the final signal.
20. Suggestions: A. Bring shade for your team(s). B. Bring own water/Gatorade, etc.
21. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion projects will be eligible for the Sale of Champions.
22. A "Top Hand" trophy buckle will be awarded to the top student exhibiting the required skill set and safety awareness needed in the current construction workforce.

All General Rules and Code of Ethics apply to this Department.

1. Entry fees are \$5.00 and must accompany the entry form when entered.
2. There will be Six divisions in this class:

These Six divisions will be split into a Junior(3rd-7th grade) and Senior(8th-12th grade) level. Grade is as of May 1. Junior and Senior levels will complete the same record book but different grading standards will be applied to each level and different quizzes will be given to each level.

2. All General Rules and Code of Ethics of the Junior Livestock Show apply to this class.
3. Competition is limited to exhibitors attending a Bosque County school or Valley Mills ISD, Bosque County 4-H, FCCLA or FFA club, and exhibitors in good standing with their club.
4. An exhibitor may enter only one animal in only one division of this class.
5. Entry deadline for this class will be the same date as the animal class entry.
6. To compete in this class, the exhibitor must do the following:
 - A. Personally feed, care for and exhibit his animal at the fair.
 - B. Keep a record book on the project and present it for grading.
 - C. Take a short quiz on commercial livestock production. Use of calculators during the quiz will be permitted.
7. The Fair Association will provide a standard record book for the exhibitors to complete. Exhibitors may add additional data and information relating to their project. ***This record book must be turned in at registration for record book quiz on Tuesday, June 6 at 6pm.*** Record books grade and judging projects for market readiness will determine the exhibitor's final score.
8. ***At 6:00 pm on the Tuesday*** before the fair begins, exhibitors must take the written quiz part of this class (Alamo Building). An alternate time for the administration of the quiz may be allowed at the discretion of the Superintendent. There will be a separate quiz for each division. Questions will pertain to the record book, commercial livestock production of that particular division and the CTYF Annual Fair Rule Book. The final 10 points of each exhibitor's score will be determined by the animal's slaughter market readiness.
9. Judging for market readiness will take place during the appropriate livestock division show after the naming of the Grand and Reserve Champion and at the discretion of the superintendent. Entrants should listen to the ring announcer for the time of this class. Failure to present your animal for market readiness evaluation will result in disqualification.
10. A final class placing will be made as determined by the combined scores for the record book, quiz and animal market readiness.
11. ***First place in Junior and Senior category in all 6 livestock divisions is eligible for sale, however they must make a 70% combined score to make the sale.***

12. Scoring Rubric:

Test = 100 points

Record Book = 100 points

Market Readiness = 50 points

Total of 250 available points

13. Exhibitor must participate in all three portions and receive 175 points or more in order to be eligible for sale.

14. Market readiness will be assigned a score 1-50 by the judge during the record quiz presentation class.

15. Tie breakers will be taken from record book in regards to completeness, legibility, and attention to detail.

1. To enter, submit entry form, recipe and \$20.00 to 4-H, FFA or FCCLA Advisor by May 1. All signatures on entry form are required.
2. Exhibitor may only enter one cake in the competition. Exhibitor will be allowed to enter Livestock Premium Sale and/or Cake Sale; however, only one entry may be in the sale. Sale order posting will be available **Wednesday at 1:00 pm at the fairgrounds office.**
3. Sale is limited to exhibitors attending Bosque County Schools, Valley Mills ISD, or Bosque County 4-H. Exhibitors must be in good standing with their 4-H, FFA or FCCLA club. Exhibitor must have been enrolled in 3rd-12th grade as of May 1 this year.
4. To qualify a cake entry for a sale slot an exhibitor must enter and exhibit one of the following: at least 20 items in the Home Economics Department; one animal; one pen of commercial heifers, one ag mechanic project; one crop show, one jackpot heifer (if entered by May 2).
5. Cakes should be delivered in a plastic, disposable cake cover or foil sheet cake pan with plastic lid. No plastic bags or wrap accepted.
6. **Cakes will be judged for sale on Tuesday at 6:00 pm. Cake must be brought to HE Building 4:00 - 5:30 pm. Cakes may be picked within 30 minutes of judging conclusion, approximately 9:00 pm. Any cakes not picked up will be discarded.**
7. Exhibitor must present cake at **check-in with their cake, a complete copy of their recipe, and must be prepared to answer any questions about their cake preparation. Exhibitor must make their own cake from scratch. Any exhibitor who does not appear to have made their own cake or appears to have used any of the following prohibited items may be disqualified by the Superintendent: cake mixes, box mixes, pre-made icing, pre-made fondant.**
8. Each category will be judged and ranked by two judges using a score sheet. Entries will be judged on appearance (exterior and interior), color (crust and crumb), texture and taste.
9. Final ranking of all cakes will be performed by a panel of three judges (different from category judges).
10. Sale order will be picked from highest placing entry in each category. For example, the first place cake in a specific category is selected for sale, and then the second place cake in that same category moves up to be judged against other first place cakes. This will continue until all cakes are ranked.
11. Sale is limited to top **10 cakes**. Sale of cakes will be conducted along with livestock at 1:00 pm on Saturday.
12. Sale qualifiers must bake an identical fresh cake for the sale. Cakes should be brought to the sale at 12:30 pm on Saturday. Cakes should be delivered in an ice chest.

5. The fee is \$1 for each entry. There will be no refund of entry fees.
6. Entries must be delivered between 12:00 pm and 7:00 pm on Wednesday. Superintendents will have the right to reclassify any entry to comply with the rules and regulations in this book, or if they feel it is in the best interest of the entry.
7. Entries will be released Saturday at 1PM. No early pick-up of entries. Prior to entry pick-up, check with the front desk to secure entry form and money.

DIVISION C ART

SPECIAL RULES

1. To protect artwork, non-canvas illustrations must be matted and backed with material such as poster board, foam board or heavy construction paper to prevent sagging.
2. Professional mats are recommended, but not required. Frames are not allowed.
3. Mat must not exceed 3½" on any side. Double matting is acceptable, but total matting must not exceed the 3½" maximum.
4. Wet paintings will not be accepted.
5. Charcoals and pastels must be sprayed with a fixative.
6. Paintings on canvas with wooden stretcher frames must have a hook or wire on back for hanging, but need not be matted.
7. Paintings on hardboard canvas may be matted or mounted with sturdy poster board instead of using hooks or wires. A minimum mat edge of 1" will enable us to display the artwork with clips without damage to the canvas board.

5. All photos will be labeled on the back of the photo with the following

 - C. Class of entry including the number and description

3. All canned foods must have been canned within the last year.
4. Pectin such as Sure-Jell may be used (Gelatin is not a pectin).
5. Not artificial coloring may be used. Flavored gelatin and flavored candy are considered artificial coloring.
6. Food must be packed in standard canning jars (half-pint, pint, or quart canning jars). Standard jar lids and rings must be free of rust and corrosion.
7. Jars must be properly sealed. Any jar that does not have a good seal will be disqualified.
8. Entries will be judged on color, consistency, flavor, texture, pack and taste.
