Record Book Tips

This tip sheet is intended for help only. It is not part of the record book.

- 1. Be neat, accurate, and complete.
- 2. Cover Sheet: The line for class refers to Swine, Lamb, Steer, Goat, Rabbit or Poultry.
- 3. The project plan page is simply to help you plan for your project. All answers to these questions are estimates and you will not be judged on whether or not you met your projections.
- 4. You are encouraged to weigh your animal at the beginning and near the end of the project. Accurate weights will make your data more accurate. If you are not able to weigh your animal on a scale, then you may need help from your parents or project advisor to get an accurate estimate.
- 5. While your project will not be completed until your animal is sold after the fair, for the purpose of the record book competition, you must close out your record book when you take your quiz. It will probably be necessary for you to weigh your animal a few days before then or make as accurate an estimated weight as possible. Use this estimated weight to complete Section VIII Project Summary.
- 6. If you have two animals that are being fed together, use this record book for only one animal. Enter only the expenses of one animal in this book.
- 7. Record books will be returned during the fair.
- 8. Proper completion and understanding of the record book will help prepare the exhibitor for some of the quiz questions.
- 9. The quiz portion of this competition will be given at the time set by the Fair Board. Exhibitors can expect general questions on breed characteristics, feeding and management practices, health care, reproduction, and carcass characteristics. There will be a different quiz for each class. The exhibitor will only take the quiz for the class he/she is entered in. The quiz may be multiple choice, fill in the blank, or true/false. Part of the quiz will always be a problem to determine factors such as feed conversion, average weight gain and profit/loss on a project.
- 10. Do the book yourself in your own handwriting.
- 11. Computer or simulated versions are not acceptable.
- 12. Use only the Central Texas Fair Official Fair Record Book.
- 13. For pen entry animals (poultry and rabbits), complete this book based on 1 pen of animals (3).

SOME QUESTIONS WILL BE BASED ON THE RULES FOR THE CENTRAL TEXAS YOUTH FAIR. SENIOR QUIZZES WILL ALSO ASK QUESTIONS ABOUT COMMERCIAL LIVESTOCK PRODUCTION PRACTICES.

RECORD BOOK

DO THE OFFICIAL FAIR RECORD BOOK IN YOUR HANDWRITING. DO NOT LET ANYONE ELSE WRITE IN YOUR BOOK. COMPUTER SIMULATION IS NOT ALLOWED.

- 1. Be neat from front cover to back cover.
- 2. Project plan page all figures are estimates only.
- 3. Put dollar sign (\$) on all figures where applicable.
- 4. Make sure your calculations are correct.
- 5. Include your CTYF entry fee and validation fee as a miscellaneous expense.
- 6. Make sure you know how to do all calculations in the project summary section. This will help you on the problem portion of the quiz.
- 7. Write detailed essays. Essay portions left blank will receive no credit.
- 8. Write in complete sentences.
- 9. Under variables do not just write "none." Write "there were no unusual circumstances that affected the outcome of my project."
- 10. Columns of numbers should all be lined up in a straight line.
- 11. 1st place in Junior and Senior category in all 6 livestock divisions is eligible for the sale, however they must make a 70% combined score to make the sale Record book is worth 100 points, quiz is worth 100 points, and market readiness is worth 50 points. You must have a combined total of 175 points or more in order to make the sale. You must participate in all 3 portions.
- 12. Market readiness score is determined by the judge in the ring during your species record quiz class
- 13. Tie breakers will be taken from record book in regards to completeness, legibility, and attention to detail.
- 14. Accommodations for students requiring help reading the quiz is available and will be provided by a volunteer who cannot be the students' family member, coach, or advisor. Please notify the Superintendent prior to the quiz so that sufficient volunteers can be provided.

DO YOUR RECORD BOOK AHEAD OF TIME INSTEAD OF TRYING TO DO IT ALL THE NIGHT BEFORE THE QUIZ.

VIII. Project Summary

While your project is not finished yet, it is close enough to being completed for you to do some calculations to see how your animal performed. It will be necessary for you to estimate your animal's weight on the Friday before the fair. Your project advisor or parents can help you make this estimate. For pen animals, calculate figures for just your best 3 animals not the entire flock/herd. For weight related questions show data as an average x 3. Example: average 3 pounds x 3 animals =9 lbs total.
